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Laundry Rooms Go Upscale

Laundry rooms of old were small, dimly lit spaces with room for little more than the washer and dryer. Not anymore, and no wonder. Americans do, on average, 400 loads of laundry a year, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. Families spend a lot of time in this room.



One of the first things to consider in a renovation is location. Laundry rooms traditionally have been located either in basements or near the kitchen or garage – the complete opposite end of the house from where the dirty clothes tend to accumulate and the clean clothes need to be put away.

It can take a lot of work to relocate a laundry room; there's soundproofing and waterproofing, new supply and drain lines to run and probably some upgraded wiring to accommodate a dryer's power needs. But your legs and back will thank you in the long run and you'll have a nice selling point at resale. If relocating the laundry room isn't practical, you may want to consider installing a laundry chute in a location that is central to the bedrooms, which would go a long way towards making life easier.

You'll also want ample lighting to help you match socks and to puzzle out just exactly what those stains are on your kids' T-shirts and jeans. It's always preferable to have a window in a laundry room. If that's not an option, consider installing a skylight or sun tube.

For flooring, tile is the preference. If your budget is tighter, a good quality vinyl will do just fine.

Cabinetry and countertops in upscale laundry rooms often play off what's used in other parts of the house, but in less expensive versions. If the laundry room is near the kitchen, for example, it's common to use the same finish and style of cabinets as in the kitchen, but in complementary stock units instead of custom pieces.

Once you have the basics covered, think about your family's specific needs. Built-in cabinets or cubbies are the perfect place to store sports equipment, backpacks and gardening gear. If you have a family pet, consider adding a dog-washing station or a place for your cat to curl up and watch you do your chores.

If you tend to fold your laundry right out of the dryer, include a folding station by extending a countertop along one wall with rods overhead to hang up the delicates you can't toss in the dryer. A flat screen TV on the wall will keep you entertained as you sort, fluff and fold. With the addition of a few dowels and pegs on the wall, that folding area can double as a gift-wrapping station.

Wood

Pros: Sustainable, functional, economical Cons: Easily damaged, high-maintenance

Laminate (Formica, Wilsonart)

Pros: Inexpensive, easy to clean, reproduces a more expensive look (especially in the high-definition lines)

Cons: Damages easier than solid surface tops, tough to repair

Solid surface (Corian, LG Hi-Macs)

Pros: Very versatile, lots of color choices, easy to clean, repairable

Cons: Prone to stains, burn marks and scratches

Granite

Pros: Chip and scratch resistant, fits into any decor, considered an upgrade, its natural beauty is hard to duplicate (especially in the higher end tiers), very durable

Cons: Expensive, prone to staining, needs to be sealed periodically

Engineered stone (Silestone, Caesarstone, Cambria, Zodiaq, Hanstone)

Pros: Very durable, scratch resistant, stain resistant, maintenance-free Cons: Expensive
